Please consider nominating a volunteer, or two, for this award!


Nominations will remain confidential and to be known only to the member submitting the nomination, the Secretary, and judges.



Deborah & Sheena - editors of Snippets




From the moment I was introduced to
Deborah and Sheena, the new volunteer coeditors of Snippets, I was impressed by their
knowledge, experience, and connection.
QFHS will be well served by them. I watched
as they were led through their requirements,
asked pertinent questions, and embraced the
Society's mission. Now let's find out a little
more.

Deborah Clark-Dickson is an advocate of plain English and was co-writer of the textbook *Clear and Precise: Writing Skills for Today's Lawyer.* Deborah supports causes such as animal welfare, theatre, and health issues. She joined QFHS about 16 months ago, partly to find information for the Treasury of Country Australian History (TOCAH), an association for which she was then on the committee. One of her grandfathers was a solicitor who practised in Barcaldine, then Brisbane, dealing with rural legal matters generally, while the other managed large properties in the Longreach area, including Marathon and Wellshot. Deborah grew up on a property outside Longreach, the daughter of rural people on both sides, and thus her interest in family history is largely based on the history of rural properties and the people who owned and ran them.

Sheena de Jager Miles was born in Scotland, where she lived until moving to Australia in 1973 with her Dutch Australian husband. Her four adult children keep her in touch with matters elsewhere. One is in the UK, two in Sydney, and one here in Brisbane. Sheena is passionate about many matters. She took part in the Moonlight Walk to raise funds for MS. For more than 20 years Sheena has edited the monthly newsletter of the Queensland Finch Society and her love of photography is put to good use photographing birds in the wild. Sheena enjoyed the challenges of her work as a computer programmer. In retirement, this talented lady took up bridge playing and enjoys a spin around the dance floor in social ballroom dancing. Although Sheena has been a member of the QFHS for some years, she has had little time to delve into her family history. She plans to rectify that that in the near future.

Eric & the Central European Interest Group



Eric Kopittke is the convenor of the Central European Interest Group. He is approachable and knowledgeable, welcoming and supportive. The German Group, later the European Group, and currently the Central European Group, began in 1984 with interested people undertaking their own research.

Eric says their aim still is to assist members to find family details from relevant European countries. They have been instrumental in gathering for the library maps, atlases, gazetteers and other resources. This is enormously beneficial because of the challenge of dealing with records not in English.

Eric and Rosemary Kopittke joined QFHS in early 1985 to research their own families. Eric joined the German group, as six of his great-grandparents had been born in the second German Empire. It was when he commented at a meeting that he had been unable to find the immigration of two of his great-grandparents in the card index at the Queensland State Archives that another member suggested that, because some lists of passengers arriving in Brisbane had been destroyed in the 1893 floods, he might look through the microfilm copies of lists of emigrants leaving Hamburg. They had ordered two such microfilms at the LDS church at Kangaroo Point. Consequently, Eric found his missing great-grandparents along with several other relatives.

Realising that he would not be the only person whose ancestors could be found in the emigrant lists from Hamburg but not in Australian immigrant lists, he and Rosemary gradually transcribed and indexed those Hamburg emigrant lists for vessels departing from Hamburg for Australian and New Zealand ports in the years 1850-1879. They have been pleased to find that they helped many researchers find missing immigrant ancestors.

I, myself, was unaware of their involvement when I discovered my own family's migration records from Hamburg on several different ships.

Eric and the Central European Interest Group are always happy to learn about successes and help with frustrations in your family





Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear. Nonetheless they can provide relevant information and may allow a better copy of the document to be located from current online sources.

This new and unique index has been added to Queensland Family History Society's valuable collection of searchable datasets. Our 62 searchable datasets provide access to information in electoral rolls, school admissions records, shipping and migration, occupations, cemeteries to name a few categories. While over half a million entries are available for online search by the general public, some 15 million more are reserved for QFHS members only.

The impact of scams

Scammers are criminals who manipulate and deceive you into giving them your money or personal information. They deliberately induce feelings of shame, guilt, self-doubt and distrust. Scammers create and take advantage of different situations, including when you are distracted, busy, fearful, anxious or stressed.

Being scammed can cause significant emotional distress and financial hardship.

Scammers isolate you from your real-life support networks. They want to create a situation where you rely entirely upon them. People are less likely to report scams when they feel ashamed.

The important role of sharing stories in scam prevention



Almost everyone you know has encountered a scam. By talking to each other, we can make sure no one is alone in the fight against scams.

If you have identified or encountered a scam, it is important that you share your story with someone – it could be your mates, family, colleagues, social networks, or community.

By sharing your scam story, you can prevent someone else from having their money or personal information taken by a scammer. The more stories we hear, the better equipped we are to protect ourselves.

Through sharing stories about scams, we can help to prevent Australians from being scammed.



Hopes and Fears: Australian Migration Stories

A new free exhibition at the National Library - available online for those who cannot visit in person.

It showcases how migrants, who have come from all parts of the globe, have helped to make Australia one of the most diverse nations in the world.

The exhibition features letters to loved ones back home, music recorded by migrants,



vintage advertising for boat voyages to

Australia, and amazing stories like that of William 'Billy' Blue, an African American transported to Sydney in 1801 for stealing raw sugar and later appointed by Governor Lachlan Macquarie as a harbour watchman and constable.

Visitors will be able to see items such as a convict's uniform from Van Diemen's Land in the 1830s, photos and ephemera from the Snowy Hydro-electric Scheme that employed 60,000 migrants from more than 30 countries and archival photos of multicultural cafes and chefs that brought the taste of home to migrants in various Australian cities.

The exhibition is free and open until February 2025. No bookings required.
