An award recipient will have made a significant contribution to:

- · the Society that is of benefit to all members whether it be
 - to improve society resources (research material, educational resources) or
 - to help with the general running of the Society (library assistants, special interest groups, Management Committee positions, or
 - o involvement in helping members and many other specialised tasks that are required to make a successful society.

All involvement must be on a volunteer basis and not done for self-promotion or monetary gain. No person may receive the award more than once.

Previous recipients of the Award for Services to Family History are <u>listed on the website</u> <u>here</u>. As you will see there, multiple awards may be presented each year.

Please consider nominating a volunteer, or two, for this award!

Nominations will remain confidential and to be known only to the member submitting the nomination, the Secretary, and judges.



Nominations must address the criteria detailed above (in up to 500 words) and must be submitted <u>via the online form here</u> by 30 September.

In summary, a Secretary:


- Keeps a track of regulatory and legislative compliance, decision-making and ethical obligations.





Introducing ... Volunteer or SIG profile

Colonial India and the Far East Special Interest Group (SIG)



Convenors: Dette Glenday and Wendy Angliss

Dette and Wendy have been members of QFHS for many years, but it wasn't until 2017 that, prompted by the everenthusiastic Charlotte Sale, they formed this group. Charlotte is currently the Welsh SIG convenor. In line with the QFHS mission, this SIG is non-discriminatory and embraces all. Dette is also the Library Roster Coordinator, and Wendy the Assistant Treasurer.

Both Dette and Wendy have extensive family connections with India. Dette's grandmother had 21 children. Her husband Mark is Anglo-Indian. His parents were born in Calcutta and both of their families migrated to England after the Partition in India, as they felt there was a better future for them there. In the 1980s Mark and his brother came to Australia with their parents for the same reasons. Since they married in 1999, Dette has been tracing his family through four generations in and around Calcutta. Wendy wanted to help her father trace his Indian connection. His grandfather Claude Hampton Chubb had been a railway engineer in the colony, and they discovered he had many other forebears in India. Wendy's mother was born in Nasik near Bombay, where her father became the Conservator of Forests and later lectured at the Forest Research. Institute in Dehra Dun.

The Colonial India and the Far East SIG is passionate about exploring the geography and history of the areas which had a profound impact on its people and welcomes those of all cultural backgrounds and experience. They have uncovered fascinating details. Did you know that Australia's convicts were to be useful provisioning passing ships and as agricultural labour for Norfolk Island flax and pine intended for masts and sails for ships plying India and the Far East in search of silks and spices, that Caroline Chisholm came to Australia with her husband, who was on R & R from India, and that many words from the IndiaFE area were spread by Shakespeare whose theatre was located near the London docks?

The Colonial India and Far East SIG has two ways of regular communication. On the second Sunday of even months,

(February, April, June, August, October, December), an online meeting is held from 10.30am-12pm. Members of the enthusiastic and growing group who attend catch up on research stories, chat about finds and issues, and enjoy a short presentation to add context to the people and places in their research. In the odd months an eNewsletter is released to members and can be accessed on the SIG page on the QFHS website. Each edition has a special theme such as Blue (ed18), Communication (ed20), and America, European powers and the IndiaFE Region - Global trade, politics and opportunism (ed23), each designed to broaden the group's collective knowledge and access to resources. Wendy says, 'We help each other locate specific records of family details through web and physical resources and our extended network'.

New members are always welcome. If you have an interest in this group, make contact via the QFHS website. The library has some relevant books and are looking to add to the supply, so if you have a suggestion, please let them know. A list of key recommended online resources is being compiled for members and the leaders are looking for volunteers to assist in making them more easily available. You do not need to be a tech expert, so if you have a little time available, help would be appreciated.



Speaker: Dr Jennifer Harrison

Wednesday 16 October 7.30pm

Dr Jennifer Harrison will join us on zoom to talk about life outside work in the years before 1859. Jennifer will investigate and identify who instituted social pursuits and how they achieved their aims. She will introduce us to what pastimes became available and what was the role played by access to delights generated by community attractions as diverse as music, literature, entertainment, education, religion, sport, holidays, food, politics and pets.

Jennifer is a research fellow with the School of Historical and Philosophical Inquiry at The University of Queensland following a career mainly based on history and biographical research. One of her main interests has been the worldwide input of the 'Coming of the Strangers' to nineteenth century Queensland. Tracing the origins of these pioneers - convicts, British soldiers, farmers, explorers and a complexity of others - raised many intriguing questions leading to much travelling over many years seeking answers. These research adventures have been a delight, as has investigating her own extended family connections which had its Australian genesis in 1792.

Allan Tonks will consider future tourism potential at just a few of the many WWII sites across Queensland. Topics likely to be covered in this presentation are False Cape and Gordonvale; Charleville: Looking beyond the Secret Base; Charlie's Hill: Site of the WWII RAAF Station 211; Round Mountain: The American penal stockade site near Beaudesert; Julia Creek's crumbling RAAF ruins; and Brisbane's own WWII Mount Coot-tha sites.

Allan is an amateur historian with a passion for hiking, heritage, and family history. He graduated in 1990 from the University of Waikato (New Zealand) with a Bachelor of Arts in history, and soon after moved permanently to Queensland.

Allan contributed a chapter titled 'The Rigby family during the First World War' to the 2020 publication STEPHENS and WAR, which was produced by the Annerley Stephens History Group with support from the RHSQ. He has since given a number of presentations on his favourite topic, Americans at Mount Coot-tha during WWII.

Their services and resources can be accessed for free online at FamilySearch.org or by visiting a FamilySearch Affiliate Library - QFHS is one but there are over 6000 world-wide.

The project repurposes a long-standing open-sourced dataset from the Queensland State Archives. Our adaption was originally commenced in 2020 but set aside due to Covid, data quality issues, and work on other projects.

Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear. Nonetheless they can provide relevant information and may allow a better copy of the document to be located from current online sources.

This new and unique index has been added to Queensland Family History Society's valuable collection of searchable datasets. Our 62 searchable datasets provide access to information in electoral rolls, school admissions records, shipping and migration, occupations, cemeteries to name a few categories. While over half a million entries are available for online search by the general public, some 15 million more are reserved for QFHS members only.

Book Club Monday 26 August 7:30 pm – Question 7 by Richard Flanagan

I'm glad I decided to join this event, which is especially for readers of fiction and non-fiction about family history, history and local history. Alex Daw (Book Club Convenor, member of the education team, and resource acquisitions volunteer), Charlotte Sale (Committee Member, convenor of the Welsh SIG, Research Team Coordinator, Constitution and Bylaws Volunteer, ZOOM Accounts Manager for Member Programs), and Rosie Gall (QFHS Services to Family History Award recipient 2023, Donation of library materials volunteer) were welcoming, enthusiastic, insightful. There were lots of laughs as we shared information and ideas, with someone reminding us that we bring our own experience to our reading. I will be a regular going forward.

Question 7 by Richard Flanagan

Flanagan refers to his book as a 'love note to my parents and my island home'. The book begins, 'In the winter of 2012 ... I visited the site of Ohama Camp, Japan, where my father had once been interned'. *Question 7* portrays the genocide of Tasmania's Indigenous peoples and mention was made of similar themes in books such as *Killing for Country* by David Marr. Flanagan's own near-death experience is included. The title was inspired by Chekhov's absurdist joke question in a story he'd written. *On May 31, a train leaves Station A at 3am and is to arrive at station B at 11pm. Just before the train is about to leave, the order comes that it must be at station B at 5pm. Who loves longer a man or a woman?* In exploring the nature of existence, Flanagan combines truth, memory and fiction. He wonders about the 'power of literature to shape the world', because HG Wells's *The World Set Free* is the first connection of newly discovered radioactivity to a destructive device and Szilard (a reader) and Einstein fought for the Manhattan Project. Flanagan says good literature provokes questions and he's interested in how and what we each remember and how we try to make sense of the senseless. He says eventually memories disappear. Even language will become redundant. For hierarchical Europeans, time is linear but for some communities, it is richly circular and immersive. This book has a density and complexity which reward the reader's commitment.

Other books discussed

Throughout the meeting books were cited, prompted by and commenting on points raised in discussion. These included: *The Battle of One Tree Hill – The Aboriginal Resistance That Stunned Queensland* by Ray Kerkhove and Frank Uhr, *Normal Women* by Philippa Gregory, *Dirrayawadha* by Anita Heiss, who this year begins an Indigenous imprint for Simon & Schuster. We talked about *The Vandemonian War – The secret history of Britain's Tasmanian invasion* by Nick Brodie, *Collected Poems* by Margaret Scott. Rosie spoke about *My Grandfather's Clock* by Graeme Davison and Alex enlightened us about *Graft: Motherhood, Family and a Year on the Land* by Maggie MacKellar - set in Tasmania. Char had read the memoir, *Reckless* by Marele Day and reported about a Society of Australian Genealogists talk on *People of the River: Lost Worlds of Early Australia* by Grace Karskens. Dornell mentioned *Love Unleashed* by Melanie Saward and *Kakadu Man* by Bill Neidjie, Stephen Davis and Allan Fox. We each went away with a long list of other books to read from sharing our reading experiences.

Archie Moore - Family History in Art

In some exciting news for people in Brisbane, Queensland artist Archie Moore's amazing family-related artwork, *kith and kin*, is coming home to QAGOMA. Currently showing at the Australia Pavilion in Venice, it will be displayed at GOMA from August 2025.

In *kith and kin*, Moore follows his maternal First Nations (Kamilaroi/Bigambul) and paternal convict (British/Scottish) heritage in a vast hand-drawn genealogical chart.

The work was awarded the Golden Lion for Best National Participation at this year's Venice Biennale. The Australian Government acquired the work, and it is to be gifted to QAGOMA and its acquisition partner, the Tate in the UK. These two leading art museums will ensure the work's forceful and poetic contribution to First Nations truth-telling will remain on a global platform.



Hopes and Fears: Australian Migration Stories

A new free exhibition at the National Library - available online for those who cannot visit in person.

It showcases how migrants, who have come from all parts of the globe, have helped to make Australia one of the most diverse nations in the world.



The exhibition features letters to loved ones back home, music recorded by migrants, vintage advertising for boat voyages to Australia, and amazing stories like that of William 'Billy' Blue, an African American transported to Sydney in 1801 for stealing raw sugar and later appointed by Governor Lachlan Macquarie as a harbour watchman and constable.

Visitors will be able to see items such as a convict's uniform from Van Diemen's Land in the 1830s, photos and ephemera from the Snowy Hydro-electric Scheme that employed 60,000 migrants from more than 30 countries and archival photos of multicultural cafes and chefs that brought the taste of home to migrants in various Australian cities.

The exhibition is free and open until February 2025. No bookings required.



For the past several years, we have chosen an illustrated cover from *The Queenslander* to add to the header for Snippets.

The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State - of Queensland.

With weekly publication spanning 60+ years, there were many (out-of-copyright) images to consider as a header for Snippets.
