The award presentation takes place at the Volunteers Thank You Morning Tea in December each year.

An award recipient will have made a significant contribution to:

- family history in general for the benefit of all family historians, or
- the Society that is of benefit to all members whether it be
 - o to improve society resources (research material, educational resources) or
 - to help with the general running of the Society (library assistants, special interest groups, Management Committee positions, or
 - involvement in helping members and many other specialised tasks that are required to make a successful society.

All involvement must be on a volunteer basis and not done for self-promotion or monetary gain. No person may receive the award more than once.

Previous recipients of the Award for Services to Family History are <u>listed on the website</u> <u>here</u>. As you will see there, multiple awards may be presented each year.

Nominations will remain confidential and to be known only to the member submitting the nomination, the Secretary, and judges.



Introducing ... Volunteer profile

Susie der Kinderen

Assistant Secretary - Correspondence



Susie has held several significant volunteer roles in QFHS. She explains how she has been involved and her family history interest areas.

'2024 **Assistant Secretary Correspondence:** In this role I check the secretary's email account and forward the mail to the appropriate people. I also check the postal mail at the QFHS Resource centre each week and I respond to emails and postal mail if I can assist. Before each management meeting, I forward to the management committee a correspondence report. I enjoy this role as it is flexible and not too labour intensive. I am happy to be able to help the secretary and management committee in this small way.

'2017-2021 **Publicity Officer** – For four and a half years I was the publicity officer. This was my first volunteer role at QFHS. I was busy delivering family history talks and tutorials to libraries in the Moreton Region and talks to local clubs and societies. I regularly wrote newspaper/magazine articles for monthly publications promoting our events, services and SIG's. I enjoyed this role and met many wonderful people in QFHS and the local community.

'2018-2022 **Education Team** – This role was also very rewarding. I enjoyed working with the Education Team helping to deliver the beginners sessions, helping out at events and at times presenting a session for our members and the family history community.

'Reason for joining QFHS: I was a tutor with U3A for about four years, delivering classes for members wanting to begin researching their family history. I joined QFHS because I wanted to re-connect with people with the same interests, with more specialized knowledge and experience to help me with my research.

'Family research areas: My family history is Australia (NSW), England, Scotland and Ireland. I am currently writing up the history of my four convict ancestors. This has been a lot of fun. Interestingly, I have no Queensland connections at all. All my family history is based in NSW, making my research a bit more challenging. I am currently researching my husband's Dutch family ancestry in Batavia (Indonesia) from the 1750s.

'Relevant work history: My working life was with the State Library of Queensland and was certainly not a traditional library role. I had a number of roles and positions within SLQ and these roles were always varied and challenging.

'During 1998/2000 one of my positions was as an internet trainer, then project manager for the BHP Skillsnet.Roadshow,

This project delivered internet skills training to regional, remote and isolated communities throughout Queensland via the public library network. It brought the internet to Queenslanders who didn't know what the internet or emails were let alone how to use them. There were classes from basic to advanced searching, homework help and other more specialized courses. We had a satellite dish, eight pcs and a server. At times it was very challenging to locate the satellite and get a signal strong enough to connect and use for training (PAK 7 satellite 38,500 miles in a geosynchronous orbit). We had to contend with mini cyclones in Cloncurry, dirt roads in Birdsville, a plague of gidgee bugs in Croydon and the Drama club at Muttaburra. During 2001-2003, once again, one of my positions was an internet trainer, then project manager for the BHP Billiton Skillsnet Roadshow.

'Another of my tasks at SLQ included web editor and content provider. During this time, I also did online database tutorials with library people throughout Queensland and created Youtube videos on SLQ databases for libraries. These varied work skills have been a great asset in helping me and hopefully others in their family research. After working at SLQ I was a bit bored in retirement, so I went to work for Moreton Library Service for several years, delivering computer skills training. Eventually, I did retire.

'Special Interest Group: I have recently joined the Colonial India and Far East SIG. I know joining this group will be invaluable in giving me ideas and resources to continue my research into the society, politics and life in Batavia in the times I am researching for my husband.'

Commentary on a presentation to the QFHS **History Group** by Chris Schuetz on 13 September 2024.

General Ian Hamilton

Those who attended the presentation on General Ian Hamilton, excellently delivered by Chris Schuetz, enjoyed an enthralling, informative, deeply researched event. The fascinating examination of this period of Australian and world history stirred a desire to know even more. The event that prompted this research was the reviewing of Australian troops at Ascot racecourse by General Ian Hamilton, from Britain, in February 1914, and Chris's desire to know WHY? The following summary does not do justice to the details we were given.

British troops arrived in Australia with the First Fleet in 1788, to control the convicts, any unrest from original inhabitants and potential outside invasion. At various times, fears surrounded the activities of Russia, Germany, China and Japan. By 1869 British troops were being replaced by local military authorities, with

Queensland having its own from 1860, civilians being trained at Fort Lytton from about 1880. Civilians generally joined Rifle Brigades with the focus on shooting accuracy rather than military drills.

Because of the world potential for warfare, Britain wanted to ensure Australia would be able and willing to offer support if needed and undertook federation conferences. Compulsory military training produced a national guard, with the stipulation in 1903 that the trainees would not be required to serve overseas. Kitchener paid a visit in 1909 and, with Hamilton and Defence Minister George Pearce, was involved in an Imperial Conference in 1911. War with Germany was considered inevitable, and Australia's stance changed, allowing for 10,000 Australian troops to be available for overseas duty. NCOs came from existing ranks and officers trained at what was to become the military college in Duntroon. Still the extent of Australia's preparedness was kept quiet. From 1911, school cadets worked with high school students, and militia volunteers had 16 days' drill from 1912.

In 1914, Hamilton made his first visit to Australia, taking a train from Sydney including stops at Armidale and Wallangarra, then travelling by car to Toowoomba and Brisbane before moving on to other states and eventually New Zealand. While in Brisbane, Queensland troops gathered at Roma Street station and travelled to Ascot racecourse where, under the Australian flag, they marched past General Ian Hamilton and other dignitaries for the taking of the salute. On August 3, Australia's available troop number was increased to 20,000. On August 6 Britain, and thus Australia, was at war with Germany.

Hamilton had relatives in Australia and cousins of his served at Gallipoli, with one relative using this connection to gain entry to the Australian Airforce. This relative had served at Gallipoli and after recovering from his wounds in England wished to get back in the fight. Hamilton had served in many places, including India and Africa (where he met the war correspondent Winston Churchill). During World War I, Churchill chose Hamilton to lead the British in Gallipoli. He became Regimental Colonel of the Gordon Highlanders until 1939. When he died, he was buried in Doune, home of one of his ancestors. General Ian Hamilton was a truly remarkable man.

Management Committee News

New By-law passed

The award of Fellowship (Fellow of the Queensland Family History Society Inc.) was created in 2000 to acknowledge members who have gone 'above and beyond the call of duty' in their endeavours in support of the Society. It is our most prestigious award. To date it has been governed only by a procedure document. On 8 October 2024 the Management Committee passed a bylaw to clarify and confirm this award.

BY-LAW 6. AWARD OF FELLOWSHIP

- The Management Committee may confer the honour of a Fellowship (Fellow of the Queensland Family History Society Inc.) on a member of the Society who has provided:
 - long and sustained promotion of the Society in multiple facets of family history and genealogy,
 - creative ideas related to family history and genealogy carried through for the benefit of the Society, which raise the Society's stature or finances.
 - continuous contribution to the running of the Society not necessarily through being on the Management Committee.
- 2. The number of Fellows of the Society shall be limited to 15 living Fellows at any time. Whilst there is no requirement for the Management Committee to confer an honour of Fellowship each year, the number permitted to be conferred in any one year under this by-law shall be limited to three (3).
- 3. Nomination of a member for the award of Fellowship may be made by one or more members of the Society. The Management Committee may from time-to-time set a date by which nominations for a given year shall be received by the Secretary. After the closing date, a Fellowship Sub-Committee shall be appointed by the Management Committee to consider any nomination/s and to make any recommendation for the award of a Fellowship to the Management Committee.

- The Fellowship Sub-Committee shall consist of a maximum of five members, including the President, maximum two (2) other members of the Management Committee, and a maximum of two (2) Fellows, appointed by the Management Committee.
- 5. The Award of Fellowship shall additionally be deemed to confer Honorary Life Membership as provided for in Clause 4(3) of the Constitution on any member who is not already a Life Member or Honorary Life Member.



Civilising Brisbane

Speaker: Duncan Richardson 20 November 2024, 1 pm

Hybrid - in QFHS Research Centre and online





Duncan Richardson, author of *Civilising Brisbane* and other works, will talk about three women who battled to improve health care, the arts, and education in Brisbane.

Duncan migrated to Australia in 1970, taught in Botswana from 1987 to 1988, and returned to work in Australia as a part-time teacher. His fiction has been published in various anthologies such as Obliquity, Futurevisions, Subtropical Suspense, Lighthouses and Within/Without Walls. In 2008, his verse play The Grammar of Deception was produced and broadcast by ABC Radio National.

Duncan has published several children's books, including readers for Macmillan, Wennabees and Yum-Worms(2005), Revenge (2005), Jason Chen and the Time Banana (2008) and Dinomania (2014). He was a part time English as a Second Language teacher and regularly runs writing workshops for adults and kids. His first history book, "Year of Disaster: Brisbane 1864" was released in 2017, followed two years later by "Captives of the Spanish Lady" about the flu quarantine in 1919, and "Civilising Brisbane" in 2021, about three colonial women who changed the face of the town.

In the second half of the 19th century, Lady Diamantina Bowen, Sister Ellen Whitty and Eliza O'Connell battled indifference and prejudice to improve health care, the arts and education in Brisbane. Crossing the sectarian divide, they often worked together and their letters and diaries reveal a fascinating story of struggle to improve lives in a rapidly growing town.

(Duncan spoke to QFHS in Feb 2022 about *Beyond Distinguished Gentlemen*, early Brisbane, and in Apr 2024 about *Captives of the Spanish Lady*).



Our new Research Kiosk

Recently, the Print Library team launched a new search tool: the Research Kiosk.

The Research Kiosk accesses almost 2 million pages of information including:

- * digitised print journals (journals with lots of names and photos have been prioritised for inclusion)
- * all e-journals (search the entire contents of our e-journal collection at once) * much of the contents of the QFHS CD collection (search the entire collection of 2201 PDFs created from the CDs at once).

FamilySearch International

FamilySearch International is the largest genealogy organisation in the world. Millions of people use FamilySearch records, resources, and services to learn more about their family history. To help in this great pursuit, FamilySearch and their predecessors have been actively gathering, preserving, and sharing genealogical records worldwide for over 100 years. Their services and resources can be accessed for free online at FamilySearch.org or by visiting a FamilySearch Affiliate Library - QFHS is one but there are over 6000 world-wide.

The free FamilySearch Library October 2024 webinars focus on tips for doing research in the United States and Canada, German and Slavic countries, and Latin America, including one special class on DNA and assembling quick family trees for ways to connect to potential living relatives. Additional sessions will cover ways to get the most out of the FamilySearch Catalog and collaborate research questions with fellow genealogists in the FamilySearch Community. There will also be a class for Spanish speaking genealogists titled *Registros Parroquiales: Una introducción* (Parish Records: An Introduction).

The project repurposes a long-standing open-sourced dataset from the Queensland State Archives. Our adaption was originally commenced in 2020 but set aside due to Covid, data quality issues, and work on other projects.

Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index, many from German sources. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear. Nonetheless they can provide relevant information and may allow a better copy of the document to be located from current online sources.

This new and unique index has been added to Queensland Family History Society's valuable collection of searchable datasets. Our 62 searchable datasets provide access to information in electoral rolls, school admissions records, shipping and migration, occupations, cemeteries to name a few categories. While over half a million entries are available for online search by the general public, some 15 million more are reserved for QFHS members only.

Popular genetic testing company 23andMe is facing bankruptcy and may sell the genetic data of its 15

million customers.

Users have the option to delete their data, but the company can retain it for three years. Data that's already been sold to researchers may not be able to be deleted.

What's next?

23andMe's co-founder and CEO is attempting to buy the company's remaining shares to take back control.



Hopes and Fears: Australian Migration Stories

A new free exhibition at the National Library - available online for those who cannot visit in person.

It showcases how migrants, who have come from all parts of the globe, have helped to make Australia one of the most diverse nations in the world.



The exhibition features letters to loved ones back home, music recorded by migrants, vintage advertising for boat voyages to Australia, and amazing stories like that of William 'Billy' Blue, an African American transported to Sydney in 1801 for stealing raw sugar and later appointed by Governor Lachlan Macquarie as a harbour watchman and constable.

Visitors will be able to see items such as a convict's uniform from Van Diemen's Land in the 1830s, photos and ephemera from the Snowy Hydro-electric Scheme that employed 60,000 migrants from more than 30 countries and archival photos of multicultural cafes and chefs that brought the taste of home to migrants in various Australian cities.

The exhibition is free and open until February 2025. No bookings required.

Assistance for regional delegates - travel and accommodation subsidies

The cost of travel and accommodation may preclude some members from regional areas who would otherwise like to attend the next conference. To assist regional delegates History Qld will subsidise the attendance of up to four members of HQ member organisations at the 2025 Conference.

The amount of each subsidy will be up to \$1500 and the funds will be available for travel or mileage and accommodation. Such costs will be available for reimbursement after the Conference on production of receipts or other documentary evidence.

Preference in awarding subsidies will be given to applications from people living more than 200 kilometres from Brisbane.

Depending on the response from member societies, the management committee may in its discretion decide to grant no subsidies, or to grant more than four subsidies or to grant subsidies in amounts other than \$1500.

Applications must be in writing and reach the Secretary by Wed. **30 October 2024** This allows successful applications to take advantage of the Early Bird pricing for the conference which closes on 30 November.

Roland (Roly) Sussex - Connections Conference Dinner Speaker

"A nym by another other name might not smell sweet"

Emeritus Professor Roland Sussex OAM, FQA, Chevalier des Palmes Académiques Roland (Roly) Sussex (M.A. Hons Canterbury; PhD London) is a specialist in language, communication and culture, and health communication. He was Professor of Applied Language Studies at the University of Queensland from 1989 until 2010. Before that he taught Linguistics and Russian at the University of Reading (UK) and Monash University in Melbourne, and was the foundation professor of Russian at the University of Melbourne from 1977 to 1989.

He is currently Research Professor in the Institute for Teaching and Learning Innovation, and in the School of Languages and Cultures, at the University of Queensland. Since "retiring" he has become involved in social issues as a public intellectual. He was chair of the Library Board of Queensland from 2009 to 2014, and then Deputy Chair (2014-2016). He was President of the Alliance Française of Brisbane (2010-2017), and is currently President of the English Speaking Union of Queensland (2018-). In 2012 he was made Patron of the Institute of Professional Editors. He is co-editor of the international journal Intercultural Communication Studies, and is a member of the editorial boards of a number of academic journals.

His current research is focused on language, culture and society, technology, and, more recently, pain and health. He is a member of the PainLang Research Group at the University of Queensland, which is investigating the use of language in the diagnosis, treatment and management of pain.

His most recent major publications are *The Slavic languages* with Paul Cubberley, Cambridge University Press, 2006); Andy Kirkpatrick and Roland Sussex (eds), *English as an international language in Asia: Implications for language education.* Berlin and London: Springer-Verlag, 2012); and Andy Curtis and Roland Sussex (Eds). (2018). *Intercultural*

communication in Asia: Education, language and values. Berlin and London: Springer Verlag. And of course Word for today (University of Queensland Press, 2021).

Roly Sussex wrote a weekly column on language for the Brisbane Courier-Mail from 2006 to 2021. His talkback radio program A Word in Your Ear has been broadcast every week to Queensland on ABC radio since 1997, and for the last 20 years to South Australia. When he is not engaged in researching and writing about language, communication, culture and health, he works on his garden and acreage, rides road bikes and mountain bikes, and indulges his passion for classical music. He was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2012, and was a made a Chevalier des Palmes Académiques by the French Government in 2017, and a member of the Queensland Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2020.

MyHeritage has an important new French historical record collection



MyHeritage has just published an important new historical record collection: France, Tables of Successions and Absences, 1890–1970. This valuable collection offers an index of deceased or officially missing people from various French departments, spanning 80 years of history. It includes 26 million records, with high quality scanned images.

Gain access to the collection here:

This collection is particularly important for researchers of French heritage because it provides a valuable alternative to national death records for this period, which have not yet been digitized or made available online. MyHeritage is currently the only service that offers digitized, online access to this collection.

This release is part of MyHeritage's ongoing effort to build a robust collection of French records. Following the acquisition of Filae, and, more recently, MesAieux.com, MyHeritage now serves as one of the best resources for researching French-speaking ancestors.



Father's WW2 fork found 84 years after last meal

David Balfour was stunned after a fork belonging to his soldier father, Robert, who was reported missing in action in 1940, was found hidden in a house in northern France.

In June 1940, Pte Balfour was part of the British Expeditionary Force (BEF) fighting in France and Belgium. Following the German advance, the BEF found itself in retreat, leading to a mass evacuation of hundreds of thousands of troops from the beaches around Dunkirk, and later from Normandy.

Little is known about Fife-born Pte Balfour's fate; he was believed to have been killed on or around 12 June. His body was never found. David Balfour was born days after his father was killed.

Earlier this year, a fork was discovered in the village of Houdetot during a house renovation. Recognising the forks to be British Army-issue, a local historian made inquiries that took him to Kent, where Pte Balfour and his family lived before the war. He was then able to trace the family.

For the past several years, we have chosen an illustrated cover from *The Queenslander* to add to the header for Snippets.



The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State of Queensland.

With weekly publication spanning 60+ years, there were many (out-of-copyright) images to consider as a header for Snippets.
