
By the way, Sheena and I are planning to put out a very limited Snippets in December, just notifying you of early events next year and saying happy Christmas. It may go out a little


Award for Services to Family History

Introducing ... Volunteer profile



Jenny Davidson: convenor of the English West Country SIG

Jenny Davidson is a QFHS volunteer with several roles.

The English West Country SIG began in 1991 and has 43 members, who research in Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, and Somerset family history. Jenny has been in this group for 18 years, and convenor for eight. Members meet informally via Zoom every two months to share recent breakthroughs, difficulties, interesting websites or books, and research techniques. The group's ancestors had careers in mining, construction, the clergy, and maritime industries including Merchant and Royal Navies.

As convenor, Jenny sets up the Zoom meetings, emails members before and after (with notes), and runs the meeting. You can email englishwestcountry@qfhs.org.au to join the group. Maps, books, and hard copy journals are available at the QFHS Resource Centre.

Another role Jenny fulfills is supporting Presenting ... sessions via Eventbrite and Zoom. This takes a few hours every couple of weeks. Jenny finds organizing the Zoom

sessions okay, but Eventbrite is more challenging.

Jenny joined QFHS about 2006 because it was situated close to family. Her areas of interest include Germanic countries, DNA, Scotland, and England. Jenny loves learning the history of the early days of what is now south-east Queensland. An interesting snippet is that Jenny's mother's paternal grandfather was known only as John Johnson, but he was supposedly Dutch, possibly from what's now Germany - hence her interest in DNA.

One of Jenny's great-grandfathers came to Brisbane in the late 1850s with his siblings and parents, and she is a certificated member of our Queensland Pre-Separation Group. Membership is open to those who have at least one ancestor who lived in Queensland pre-separation (i.e. before 10 December 1859).

The day Jenny joined the English West Country SIG meeting, there were six attendees and a few apologies. The lack of numbers was immaterial, because enthusiasm and sharing of information flowed. She was able to talk about my Williams and Buncombe family connections with Fowey, in Cornwall.

Jenny has ancestors from all four counties covered by this SIG, and loves discussing her research with others. She showed us photos from her travels in the English West Country. She explained she had found records for her second cousin three times removed, Isaac Hawker, born in 1835 in Devon, from where in the 1860s he paid poor rates. She also found him in water rental books.

Jenny Davidson is another enthusiastic and active QFHS volunteer. She also loves cooking, and I wonder if she has recipes from each of her family interest counties.

I attended this event at 9.30 on 17 August 2024 at the QFHS library at 46 Delaware St, Chermside. Along with Linda Cartmill and Paula Pyburne, I signed in. A chat over morning tea broke the ice before we sat together to begin the orientation.

All three leaders of the meeting were knowledgeable, committed and truly approachable, so asking questions was not a problem.

Ann and Tony Swain, joint Member Fives, have helped the Society be what it is today through their initiative, enthusiasm and, dare I say, their long commitment. Ann is also the DNA group convenor and Queensland Pre-Separation joint convenor, while Tony is the finance officer for Shop Support and USB production. Both are frequently onsite to welcome those who call in.

Anne Long is research coordinator.

I have been a member of QFHS for some years but had never done the orientation. We

each spoke about our family research interests. Linda will be known to you as the QFHS award-winning author of *From Green to Gold – The Cartmill Family Journey from Armagh to Australia*. It was Paula's first visit to the centre, and she was clearly excited by the comprehensive range of facilities and resources.

Anne Long gave us a guided tour of the centre's resources, pointing out microfiche, maps, journals, books for borrowing, library, and research folders along the way.

Tony then took us to the computers to show us how to conduct our own research both at the centre and remotely. He sent each of us to locate a book of individual relevance and we were shown how to insert the BOOK MARKER to relocate the spot later. I found an ancestor's name in the book I'd been sent to locate!

While we were there, a talented library helper arrived and sat at a particular computer to transfer to USB research material requested by members. It is astounding the amount of quality material that is available, so if you have not done this orientation session, I strongly recommend that you do.

I am so thankful I was there. Ann, ever the scientist, pointed out how the tree-filled location allowed members to breathe in endorphins and feel better.

Commentary

Comments from member Dornell Wylie on discussion of *Killing for Country* by David Marr at a Book Group meeting held on 28 October.

Killing for Country is an important contribution to truth-telling, and David Marr relates, with unforgiving honesty, the part that two of his male ancestors played in the Frontier Wars. Both served with the Native Police. He does not include Indigenous voices because he believes that is not his place. Marr used AustLang database for names of Aboriginal peoples and the AIATSIS map of Indigenous Australia. The book was first published in 2023, with two reprints that same year.

Members present (via zoom) were thoughtful in their contributions about the selected book, which was considered rather challenging, both in material and style. Bettina joined

from the Blue Mountains and Chris joined from Rockhampton, so don't think you have to be local for this fascinating member activity. Alex pointed out that there is information about Rockhampton listed in the index to *Killing for Country*. That index covers 16 pages, so *Killing for Country* is a thoroughly researched account.

Some telling quotes: 'Neither man doubted the land was theirs for the taking'; 'When whites were out to kill, any black would do'. What is Marr telling us of the true nature of humans? Think about the story behind *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. Consider what is happening in the Middle East right now.

Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index, many from German sources.

These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but

other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear. Nonetheless they can provide relevant information and may allow a better copy of the document to be located from current online sources.

This new and unique index has been added to Queensland Family History Society's valuable collection of searchable datasets. Our 62 searchable datasets provide access to information in electoral rolls, school admissions records, shipping and migration, occupations, cemeteries to name a few categories. While over half a million entries are available for online search by the general public, some 15 million more are reserved for QFHS members only.



The Doolans of Pine Mountain and Peak Crossing

Recently, the book launch took place of *The Doolans of Pine Mountain and Peak Crossing*, written by Mary Mahon.

The Pine Mountain and Districts Historical Society hosted the launch of this captivating book, which explores the deep familial ties and remarkable journeys of two Doolan brothers, Michael and James and their sister Catherine. They emigrated from Ireland to Pine Mountain and Peak Crossing regions in southern Queensland in the 1860s.

This remarkable and meticulously researched work reveals their struggles and successes.

Michael was 24 years old when he arrived in South Queensland with his wife Susan, their infant son Patrick, and Michael's 9 year old sister Catherine. With hard work they cleared the land and established a successful farm at Pine Mountain, where Michael became a community leader.

James was 16 when he arrived in Australia, where in the first couple of years he worked in a variety of jobs across the country, from Tasmania to the unexplored wilds of far North Queensland.

These three Doolans became successful. They and their many descendants married into the Mahon, Smith, Sherlock, Culhane, McInally, McAvoy, Fitzgerald, and Dredge families, who also settled in the Pine Mountain and Peak Crossing regions.

The Pine Mountain and Districts Historical Society honours their stories. They shaped the community's heritage. This book offers invaluable insights into local history and ancestral roots.

About the speaker

Peter Huxley, like his parents, has had a life-long interest in family history. In his teens, he inherited a silver spoon with an engraved heraldic crest. This started his passion for heraldry.

Heraldry refers to all matters of the duties and responsibilities of the officers of arms. This term is frequently and incorrectly used as a synonym for Armory which is but one of the many duties of the heralds. Armoury is Peter's main interest this being the hereditary use of an arrangement of charges or devices centred on a shield, originating in the feudal society of Western Europe.

His father was granted a coat of arms from The College of Arms in London 1984. Peter acted as his father's agent. Through his Scottish ancestry, Peter has had his arms recognised by (matriculated) the Lord Lyon of Scotland.

Peter is a member of The Heraldry Society and The Australian Heraldry Society, a former Vice-President (Qld).

Now he is acting as agent for his English son-in-law in obtaining a grant of arms from The College of Arms, London. Peter is also assisting the Irish father of his other son-in-law in obtaining a grant of Arms but on this occasion from the Chief Herald of Ireland.


Thank you to those who've already contributed to our new project **We Remember Them: our family's wartime stories**. The project is off to a good start.

Hopes and Fears: Australian Migration Stories

A new free exhibition at the National Library - available online for those who cannot visit in person.

It showcases how migrants, who have come from all parts of the globe, have helped to make Australia one of the most diverse nations in the world.

The exhibition features letters to loved ones back home, music recorded by migrants, vintage advertising for boat voyages to Australia, and amazing stories like that of William 'Billy' Blue, an African American transported to Sydney in 1801 for stealing raw sugar and later appointed by Governor Lachlan Macquarie as a harbour watchman and constable.

Visitors will be able to see items such as a convict's uniform from Van Diemen's Land in the 1830s, photos and ephemera from the Snowy Hydro-electric Scheme that employed 60,000 migrants from more than 30 countries and archival photos of multicultural cafes and chefs that brought the taste of home to migrants in various Australian cities.

The exhibition is free and open until February 2025. No bookings required.

Speaker Profile



Professor Hamish Maxwell-Stewart

After graduating with a PhD from the University of Edinburgh, Hamish Maxwell-Stewart worked for the Welcome Unit for the History of Medicine, University of Glasgow until 1997 when he migrated to Australia.

As a Research Fellow at the University of Tasmania, he co-designed the highly successful Lottery of Life exhibition which ran at Port Arthur from 1999-2018.

In 2000 he was appointed to the teaching staff in the Department of History and Classics at the University of Tasmania where he worked until 2011, when he was appointed as a visiting fellow at the University of Texas.

The following year he took up the Keith Cameron Chair in Australian History at University College Dublin.

On his return to the University of Tasmania in 2013 he was appointed Associate Dean Research, for the Faculty of Arts, a position he held until 2016. During that time he established a highly successful diploma in Family History as well as teaching World History at first year level.

After a highly successful 23 years at the University of Tasmania he joined the History and Archaeology team at UNE in April 2021.

Hamish, now a professor of heritage and digital humanities at the University of New

England and the CEO of Digital History Tasmania, will discuss how data has the potential to place any individual life within the context of others in one of his two presentations at the conference.

His presentations on *How Technology is Changing Family History* is scheduled on Saturday, 22 March 2025 at 9.30am, and on *Non-European Convicts* is scheduled on Sunday 23 March 2025 at 12 noon

The Settlers' Muster Book 1800



On 23 October 2024, the NSW Parliamentary Library, in collaboration with Museums of History NSW, announced the launch of the digitised version of *The Settlers' Muster Book 1800*. The event was offered in partnership with Sydney Rare Book Week.

The Settler's Muster Book 1800 is a unique window into the early social history of the NSW colony.

Nominated for UNESCO Australia's – Memory of the World Register, it is the earliest NSW record of occupations, ship arrivals, the animals and land owned by people.

The Muster Book is actually two volumes, both held by The NSW Parliamentary Library, The 1800 Settlers Muster Book and List of Convicts Allowed to Officers June 1st 1800 Statement of the Numbers Victualled at Parramatta and Toongabbee July 1800.

MyHeritage has an important new French historical record collection



MyHeritage has just published an important new historical record collection: France,

Tables of Successions and Absences, 1890–1970. This valuable collection offers an index of deceased or officially missing people from various French departments, spanning 80 years of history. It includes 26 million records, with high quality scanned images.

This collection is particularly important for researchers of French heritage because it provides a valuable alternative to national death records for this period, which have not yet been digitized or made available online. MyHeritage is currently the only service that offers digitized, online access to this collection.

This release is part of MyHeritage's ongoing effort to build a robust collection of French records. Following the acquisition of Filae, and, more recently, MesAieux.com, MyHeritage now serves as one of the best resources for researching French-speaking ancestors.



The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State of Queensland.
