An update from our QFHS treasurer

Our society enjoys the benefits of being in a strong financial position through great work over a number of years. In an endeavour to maintain this advantage, we keep a token amount in our cheque account for payments as it generates no income stream (no interest). The current QFHS investment strategy has



the remainder of our "liquid" funds invested at optimal market

rates (currently ranging from 2.25% to 4.7% p.a). This strategy requires close monitoring however the increased interest returned is considered to be worth the effort.

Expenditure

On the expenditure front, forward estimates and their likely timing give us a guide to our requirements. To illustrate, a few of the larger cost items:

- air conditioning reinstalling \$21,500,
- new photocopier \$4,800,
- insurance policy renewals \$8,800,
- My Heritage library access \$5,181.

Looking ahead, expenditure is expected around improvements to our property, a new front door, portico, signage, further painting and down the track a mural. There will be ongoing projects as we settle into Delaware Street. Our aging IT network is currently undergoing a review and significant expenditure is anticipated in the ensuing two years.

<u>Grants</u>

We are very pleased to announce that member Peter Gehrke has undertaken to be our grants writer. Peter is focussed on locating grants applicable to our organisation, especially for the expected IT upgrade. It is pleasing to report Peter's efforts in the few months he has been onboard have gained us a BCC grant to upgrade the security lighting at Delaware St. He has several others in the pipeline being fully conversant with the time frames for lodging future grant applications.

It is expected that the society will transition its digital platforms in the ensuing few years which will afford members and the public ever evolving service facilities, and income stream opportunities.


Property

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Volunteer Profile

Jenny Davidson - East West Country SIG

Jenny Davidson is a volunteer with several roles. The English West Country SIG began in 1991 and has 43 members, researching in Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, and Somerset. Jenny has been in this group for 18 years, and convenor for eight. Members meet informally via Zoom every two months to share recent breakthroughs, difficulties, interesting websites or books, and research techniques. The group's ancestors had careers in mining, construction, the clergy, and maritime industries including Merchant and Royal Navies. As convenor, Jenny sets up the Zoom meetings, emails members before and after (with notes), and runs the meeting. You can email englishwestcountry@qfhs.org.au to join the group. Maps, books, and hard copy journals are available at our Resource Centre.

Another role Jenny fulfills is to support 'Presenting ...' sessions via Eventbrite and Zoom. This takes a few hours every couple of weeks. Jenny finds organizing the Zoom sessions okay, but Eventbrite is more challenging.

Jenny joined QFHS about 2006 because it was situated close to family. Her areas of interest include Germanic countries, DNA, Scotland, and England. Jenny loves learning the history of the early days of what is now south-east Queensland. An interesting snippet is that Jenny's mother's paternal grandfather was known only as John Johnson, but he was supposedly Dutch, possibly from what's now Germany - hence her interest in DNA.

One of Jenny's great-grandfathers came to Brisbane in the late 1850s with his siblings and parents, and she is a certificated member of our Queensland Pre-Separation Group. Membership is open to those who have at least one ancestor who lived in Queensland pre-separation (i.e. before 10 December, 1859).

The day I joined the English West Country SIG meeting, there were six attendees and a few apologies. The lack of numbers was immaterial, because enthusiasm and sharing of information flowed. I was able to talk about my Williams and Buncombe family connections with Fowey, in Cornwall.

Jenny has ancestors from all four counties covered by this SIG, and loves discussing her research with others. She showed us photos from her travels in the English West Country. She explained she had found records for her second cousin three times removed, Isaac Hawker, born in 1835 in Devon, from where in the 1860s he paid poor rates. She also found him in water rental books.

Jenny Davidson is another enthusiastic and active QFHS volunteer. She also loves cooking, and I wonder if she has recipes from each of her family interest counties?



Unlock the Past

An event held on 12-13 December 2024

This two-day workshop was held at the Geebung RSL Club and featured British presenters Chris Paton and Mia Bennett. Review of 'A Home-Grown Monarch of the Queen's State' by guest speaker Dr Gary Bacon

The presentation took place on Wednesday 18 September 2024 at 1 pm.

The first known discovery of the Hoop Pine by white men was made by John Oxley and Allan Cunningham on 21 September 1824.

Oxley: 'We penetrated through a very thick brush abounding with stately and magnificent pines, which towered far above the other timber of the hill. Mr C(unningham) procured a couple of young cones, which satisfactorily demonstrated that the tree which had excited so much admiration was an entirely new species of the genus Auricaris (Araucaria). To this stately tree Mr C gave the name of the Brisbane pine.'

Cunningham: 'Hitherto in our examination of this River, we have been only gratified with a distant view of the Pine; immediately we approached one of magnificent stature, the Monarch of these woods. It was a healthy well-grown Tree, exceeding 120 feet in height with a trunk 3'6" diam. It was totally impossible not to halt a few moments to admire this noble tree.'

The son of a logger, from his early teens, Dr Gary Bacon went out to help, as a 'bluetonguer', (doer of tough jobs). He says a tree is his favourite biota and he took us on a virtual tour of Australia to see where different species were found. He points out the benefits of trees in social, environmental and economic terms. Surprisingly, Russia has the largest expanse (25%) of the world's forests. Gary described with passion the different species, pointing out that, because of the measured benefits of green growth, there are now moves to recreate forests on high-rise buildings.

Gary elaborated on the botanical exploration of Joseph Banks, (who accompanied Cook in 1770), Robert Brown (who circumnavigated Australia with Flinders, and Allan Cunningham. (who came to Brisbane with Oxley in 1824). Gary's enthusiasm was evident in every word and movement (he stood to illustrate size and detail). He showed an illustration of Australia's first prefabricated building at Redcliffe to which were added blue gum weather boards and rafters; of Cunningham's group meeting a friendly Aboriginal Australian spear fishing in the river before they climbed Pine Mountain and found the tree that bears Cunningham's name (Araucaria cunninghami).

The hoop pine got its name from the round hoop left when a downed tree was eaten out. With the establishment of Queensland's timber industry, founded on this tree, bullock teams carried felled trunks to timber mills. Within 20 years the old forests were gone, but hoop pines began to be replanted, following the advice of Edward Swain, the man who laid the foundation of modern forestry economics in Queensland.

NOTICEBOARD

During building works at The Hutchins School in Hobart in March 2024, bones were found and construction halted — leading to the ultimate discovery of almost 2,000 bodies that were believed to have been moved from the old graveyard over which the school is located.

An archaeological team undertook what is believed to be the largest mass exhumation in Australian history, digging up the bodies and attempting to identify them — hampered by appalling burial practices and poor record-keeping.

Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index, many from German sources. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear. Nonetheless they can provide relevant information and may allow a better copy of the document to be located from current online sources.

A First Fleet reunion

In October 2025, a gathering of descendants of three convicts of the First Fleet will take place in Hobart. The purpose is to celebrate the strength and resilience of our ancestors, their unique history, and to share stories of their lives.

When the First Fleet set sail on 13 May 1787, on board the *Scarborough* were Jacob Bellett and Edward Garth and, on the *Friendship*, was Susannah Gough. All were convicts, found guilty of theft and sentenced to transportation. During their years in Australia, the three people and their subsequent families knew each other well, intermarried, and had many descendants.
